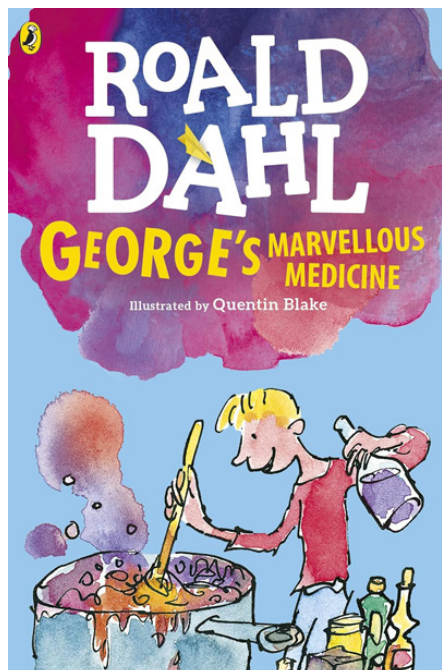

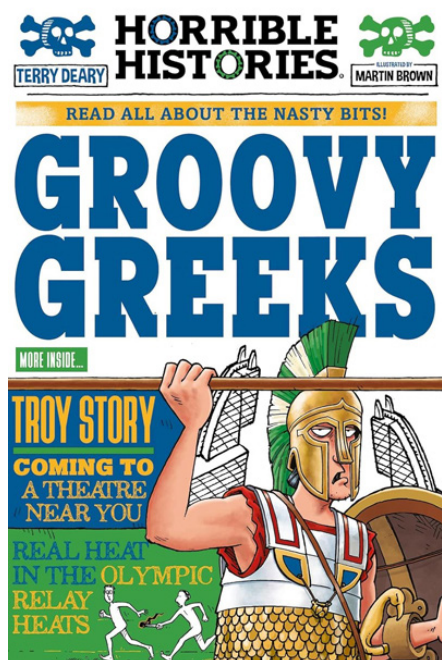
Best-loved books of 7 & 8 year old boys

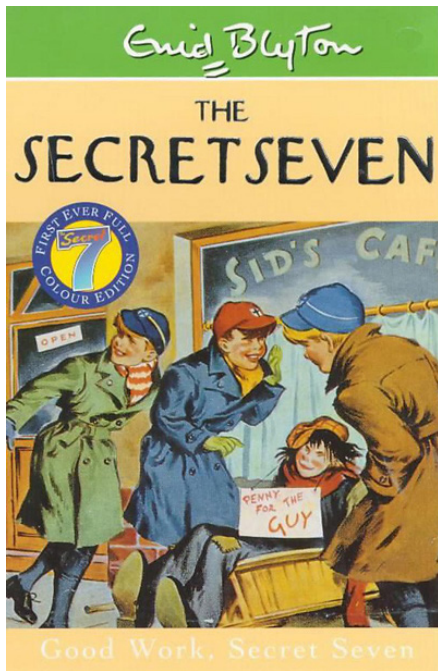
Horrible Histories: Groovy Greeks

Why did doctors taste their patients' earwax? Why didn't boys start school until they were seven? And why didn't girls have to go to school at all?

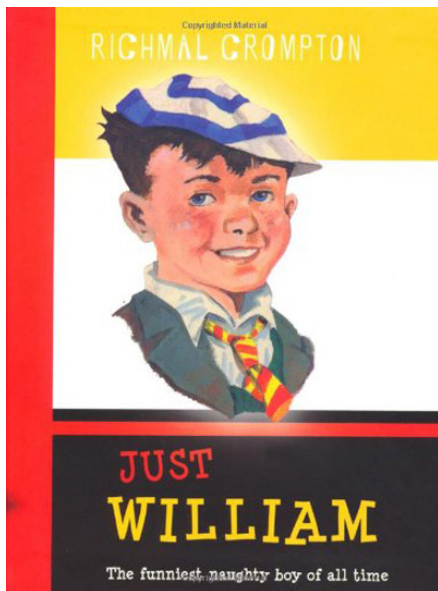
Packed with hair-raising stories and beautifully illustrated throughout, this book's a big hit with boys who like history.

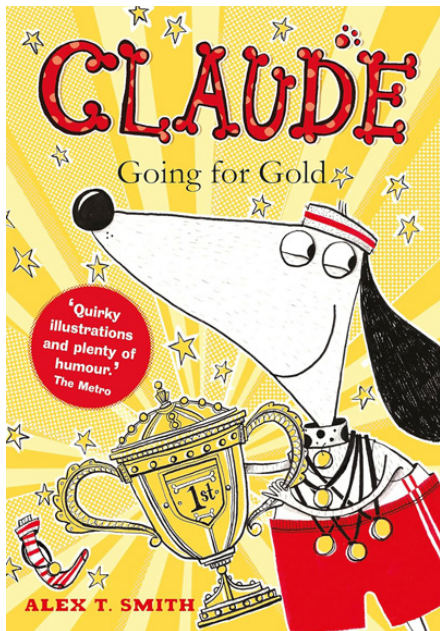
Just William

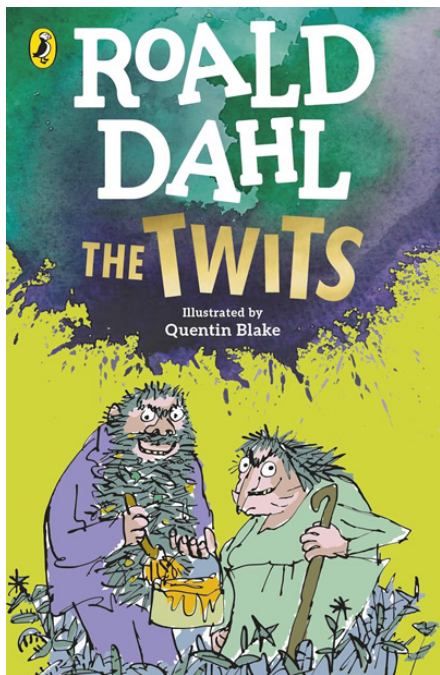
Each story is hilarious and as fresh today as it was a century ago.
